INTRODUCTION

Although this bibliography was originally made by the compiler for his own instruction and use, having been suggested by the bibliography of pipe-music in W. L. Manson's book, *The Highland Bag-pipe*, Appendix III, it is now being published by the Society in the belief that it may be of service to students of the instrument and collectors of books dealing with the bag-pipe and pipe-music.

Whilst every care has been taken to make the collection as nearly complete as possible, it is too much to hope that perfection has been achieved. Certain omissions have been deliberate, because the material affected has either appeared of insufficient importance or has been obviously derived from a standard source. The wellknown books of reference, such as the Encyclopædia Britannica, the various English histories of music, and the German works of Dr. Curt Sachs, have not been included, as it was thought that these would naturally be consulted first by those seeking enlightenment on the subject. It is regrettable that so much useful information should have been contributed to the columns of the leading Scottish and other newspapers and not published elsewhere: these articles are the despair of a bibliographer, who knows that any amount of good stuff is buried in the files of various journals, to all intents and purposes inaccessible.

The book is arranged in five sections, viz., General

Works, Northumbrian, Scottish, Irish, and Music. It will be noticed that occasionally the same work appears in two different sections, and to forestall criticism on this point it is felt necessary to say that it is a deliberate duplication for ease in consultation.

No doubt, like most bibliographies, this one contains a proportion of inaccuracies and omissions; but it would have been much worse done had it not been for the unsparing assistance that has been received from all sides, which assistance is now gratefully acknowledged.

My sincere thanks are due to my friend and colleague, Mr. William Cocks, for his advice and practical help as well as for the use of books in his collection: to Mr. Archibald Campbell, who as Secretary of the Music Committee of the Piobaireachd Society gave me all details of that Society's publications and also brought to my notice some papers on canntaireachd which would have doubtless eluded me but for his kind help: and to Mr. F. G. Rendall of the British Museum, for valuable information about books in the national library. I feel that I ought to make special mention, also, of the kindness I received from Mrs. MacLennan, widow of the late Pipe-Major George MacLennan, who in reply to my inquiry for details of Pipe-Major MacLennan's book sent me not only a charming letter giving complete details as to publication, but also a copy of the book and a list of works on piping and pipemusic in her late husband's possession. I am equally indebted to Mr. H. S. Strafford, Hon. Secretary of the Cowal Highland Gathering, for information as to the Cowal Collections of pipe-music and a copy of the most recent issue of the same. Mr. Malcolm Johnstone, Hon. Secretary of the Highland Pipers' Society of Edinburgh, very kindly lent me a copy of the earlier issue of John McLennan's book; and Mr. R. T. Best, the Librarian of the National Library of Ireland, Dublin, furnished me

with most useful details of tutors for the Irish pipes which I could not have otherwise procured without the greatest difficulty. The publishers of pipe music were also sympathetic and helpful. Messrs. David Glen & Sons and Messrs. Paterson's Publications, Ltd., provided me with lists of the music issued by them, and Messrs. Peter Henderson, Ltd., with characteristic generosity, sent me, in addition to the dates of publishing for which I had asked, specimen copies of such of their books as were in print, a graceful act which I very much appreciated. Finally, when the typescript had been completed and was ready for the printers, I received the necessary details about Geoghegan's little-known tutor for the Irish pipes, and my sincere thanks are due to Mr. Walter N. H. Harding, of Chicago, for this information, and to Mr. W. Howard Head and Messrs. Pickering & Chatto, Ltd., of London, through whose good offices I was enabled to get into touch with Mr. Harding.

In conclusion, may I say that I shall always be glad to hear from anyone who can suggest any correction or addition to the present work, so that any second edition which may be required in the future may be an improvement on this one.

#### A. GENERAL WORKS

In this section are included books on other subjects which have chapters on or substantial mention of the bag-pipe, also works on music or musical instruments in which the bag-pipe is dealt with.

1511 Musica getutscht und auszgezoge, etc. Sebastian Virdung. (M. Furter, Basle.)

The oldest printed work on musical instruments; mentions only one form of the bag-pipe, the simple mouth-blown type or cornemuse.

3 vols. (E typographeo Johannis Richteri, Wittebergae, 1615-19.)

Illustrates several forms of the bag-pipe as used in Germany at that time, and contains the earliest representation of the bellows-blown bag-pipe or musette.

1636 Harmonie Universelle, contenant la theorie et la pratique de la musique, etc. F. MARIN MERSENNE. (P. Ballard, Paris.)

Contains a very complete account of the types of bag-pipe in use at that time, viz., the cornemuse and musette, and also deals briefly with the Neapolitan surdelina.

1672 Traité de la Musette, avec une nouvelle methode. C. E. Borjon. (Jean Girin and Barthelmy Riviere, Lyons.)

Gives a good general history of the use of the bag-pipe to the date of its production, and contains many quotations from classical authors on the subject; there are complete instructions for the playing of the musette, and a number of airs adapted to it.

1738 Méthode pour la Musette, op. 10. JAMES HOTTE-TERRE. (Paris, 1738.)

I have no data as to the contents of this book. The British Museum does not possess a copy, but there is one in the Library of the Paris Conservatoire of Music. No. 7898 f.7.

1849 Musical Memoirs of Scotland. SIR JOHN GRAHAM DALYELL. (T. G. Stevenson, Edinburgh, and William Pickering, London.)

> The first chapter gives a good general history of the bagpipe with particular reference to Scotland, and authorities are always very carefully cited. There are several illustrations taken from old carvings, etc.

1888 Musical Instruments, Historic, Rare and Unique. A. J. HIPKINS, F.S.A. (A. & C. Black, Edinburgh.)

> Plates IV and V show French, Italian, Northumbrian and Lowland pipes, with a short description appended.

1894 Les Musettes. Eugene H. de Bricqueville. (Leopold Cerf, Paris, 1894.)

A pamphlet of some 36 pages, giving a brief history of the instrument.

1901 The Highland Bag-pipe: Its History, Literature and Music. W. L. MANSON. (Alexander Gardner. Paisley, 1901.)

> Brief history of the instrument in general, but very full account of the Highland pipes, with legends and stories about pipes and pipers, notes on certain pibrochs and other tunes, and appendices giving practical hints on playing and the care of the instrument; also a list of pibrochs and a bibliography of pipe music.

1907 Some Reminiscences and the Bag-pipe. ALEXANDER DUNCAN FRASER, M.D. (W. J. Hay, Edinburgh, and John Callander, Falkirk.)

Deals chiefly with the Highland bag-pipe and its music, but also mentions most other types, and is excellently illustrated. The work is somewhat rambling and discursive, but useful information is embodied in it.

1910 Old English Instruments of Music. Francis W. GALPIN, M.A., F.L.S. (Methuen & Co. Ltd., London.)

Chapter IX deals briefly with the old English bag-pipe and also mentions Northumbrian, Highland and Irish pipes.

1911 The Story of the Bag-pipe. Dr. W. H. GRATTAN FLOOD. (Walter Scott Publishing Co. Ltd., London.)

> General history of the bag-pipe from the earliest times, and deals particularly with the Irish pipes; incorporates a reprint of O'Farrell's tutor for the uilleann pipes.

1914 The Carvings of Mediæval Musical Instruments in Exeter Cathedral Church. EDITH K. PRIDEAUX. (In Archæological Journal, 2nd Series, Vol. XXII, No. 1, March, 1915: also published separately by I. G. Commin, Exeter, 1915.)

Describes the two carvings of angel bag-pipers in Exeter Cathedral, giving illustrations, and compares them with similar carvings elsewhere.

The Bag-pipe in History and Anecdote. R. Mur-DOCH LAWRANCE, F.S.A.SCOT. (William Smith & Sons, Aberdeen; printed for private circulation, 50 copies only.)

> A collection of stories and legends in regard to the bagpipe, dealing chiefly with the Scots variety.

ANDREW WIGHT, and the 1828 edition by JAMES THOMPSON. (First edition published by W. Guthrie, Blyth, and the others by Mackenzie and Dent, Newcastle.)

The first two editions have a portrait frontispiece showing Allan playing a type of mouth-blown bag-pipe, but the last one, illustrated by Geo. Cruickshank, has a portrait in which he is playing the small-pipes. The work is a more or less authentic record of the adventures of this notorious rogue, whose chief source of livelihood, apart

from piping and stealing, appears to have been enlisting as a soldier and deserting after having received his bounty money. Allan died in prison at Durham whilst serving a sentence for horse stealing.

A pamphlet of 36 pages, urging that steps be taken for the preservation of the pipe and ballad music peculiar to the county.

  Elements of musical theory, instructions for playing and keeping the pipes in order, and a few tunes.

Instruction Book for the Northumbrian Small-pipes. J. W. Fenwick. Second edition revised by William A. Cocks and Gilbert Askew. (Published for the Northumbrian Pipers' Society by Northumberland Press Limited, Newcastle.)

The text of this book is adapted from the edition of 1896, as few alterations as possible by including the control of 1896.

The text of this book is adapted from the edition of 1896, as few alterations as possible having been made; but it is practically a new book. The old tables of fingering are omitted, and simplified diagrams included in their stead. The tunes given in the first edition have not been retained, the expense of reproducing them being too great; but a long and complete article on reed-making is inserted.

1932 The Origins of the Northumbrian Pipes. GILBERT ASKEW. (In Archæologia Aeliana, 4th Series, Vol. IX.)

This paper deals exhaustively with the ancestry of the various kinds of Northumbrian bag-pipe, and attempts to show that the small-pipe has no connection with the old English bag-pipe.

## C. SCOTTISH

The Complaynt of Scotland, written in 1548, with a preliminary dissertation and glossary. Dr. John Leyden. (Edinburgh: printed for Archibald Constable, and sold by T. Cadell, junior, and W. Davies, London.)

Wedderburn's Complaynt of Scotland contains allusions to the then popular pastoral instruments, including a form of bag-pipe. Dr. Leyden's dissertation gives a summary of the history of the instrument, with references to other authors.

#### E. BAG-PIPE MUSIC

The arrangement of this section is similar to that of the preceding portion of the bibliography, i.e., the music is divided into Northumbrian, Scottish and Irish, each division being set out in order of date of publication. For much of the information as to the Highland pipe music I am indebted to Mr. W. L. Manson's book, which gives a very complete bibliography up to 1900. I have endeavoured to bring this up to date, and have indicated, where possible, which books are still obtainable. The recent publications are presumed to be still in print, and prices are given in almost all cases.

The collection was produced at short notice so as to provide a selection of airs for the use of small-pipe players at competitions which were then being arranged, as there was no such book available.
